- GERD is a common but underrecognized condition in dogs. It is particularly prevalent in brachycephalic breeds. It occurs frequently in anesthetized dogs of all breeds.
- Clinical signs are often subtle, making early diagnosis challenging.
- Treatment involves PPIs, prokinetics, dietary modifications, and in some cases, surgical interventions such as hiatal plication.

Updates on the Management of Feline Chronic Kidney Disease Dr. M. Stein

- Novel ways to manage anemia of chronic disease
- Pros and cons of new phosphate binders on the market

Chronic Intestinal Diseases in Cats: Updated Approaches to Diagnosis and Treatment Dr. F. Gaschen

Key points:

- Differentiating between chronic inflammatory enteropathy (CIE) and low-grade intestinal T-cell lymphoma (LGITL) requires mucosal histopathology and advanced diagnostic techniques like immunohistochemistry and clonality testing.
- Outcome and survival are excellent for cats with CIE and good for cats with LGITL. Other forms of intestinal lymphoma carry a more guarded prognosis.
- Inflammatory intestinal lesions may ultimately trigger the onset of lymphoma.
